PRIVACY NOTICE

For Pupils & Parents/Families/Carers/Legal Guardians

ABOUT US

Ballymena Academy is the data controller of the personal data we hold about our pupils and their parents/families/carers/legal guardians. This means that we are responsible for deciding how we hold and use the personal data which we collect.

We are required under the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) to notify you of the information contained in this privacy notice.

We collect and use pupil data under the Education Act (Northern Ireland) 2014 and other legislation. You may find the specific legislation at <https://www.education-ni.gov.uk/departments/education-legislation>.

The majority of data you provide to us is data which you are legally obliged to provide but some data is provided to us on a voluntary basis. When collecting data from you we will inform you whether you are required to provide certain data to us or if you have a choice in this.

This notice applies to prospective, current and former pupils and their families/carers/legal guardians and those applying for a place at the school and their families/carers/legal guardians. We may update this notice at any time but if we do so, we will inform you as soon as reasonably practicable.

It is important that you read and retain this notice, together with any other privacy notice we may provide on specific occasions when we are collecting or processing personal data about you, so that you are aware of how and why we are using such information and what your rights are under the GDPR.

Our Data Protection Officer (DPO) is Mr T McLeister and he monitors the school's data protection procedures to ensure they meet the standards and requirements of the GDPR. HOW DO WE COLLECT AND HOLD PERSONAL DATA?

We collect some personal data about our pupils and their families/carers/legal guardians during a pupil's application process to the school.

We will sometimes collect additional data from third parties such as the Education Authority, Department of Education, examination board or previous school attended by a pupil.

We mainly collect personal data about our pupils and their families/carers/legal guardians throughout the course of the pupil's time at the school, for instance when completing educational visit consent forms, from statutory curriculum assessments and throughout our relationship with a pupil when we are exercising our legal obligations as a public educational body and during our pastoral care.

WHAT PERSONAL DATA DO WE COLLECT, STORE AND USE ABOUT OUR PUPILS?

Personal data is information that identifies you and relates to you. We will collect, store and use the following categories of personal data about our pupils:

- Personal information (such as name, age, date of birth, photographs and unique pupil number)
- Contact information (such as address, emergency contact information and telephone number)
- Attendance information (such as sessions attended, number of absences and absence reasons)
- Assessment information (such as statutory assessment process, GCSE and post-16 qualifications and standardised tests provided by commercial companies)
- Exclusion and behavioural information
- CCTV footage captured in school and other information obtained through electronic means
- Non-sensitive characteristic data (such as free school meal eligibility)
- Special categories of data (such as ethnicity, language, country of birth, nationality, information regarding health, special educational needs, allergies and disability).

WHAT PERSONAL DATA DO WE COLLECT, STORE AND USE ABOUT OUR PUPILS/PARENTS/FAMILIES/CARERS/LEGAL GUARDIANS?

We will collect, store and use the following categories of personal data about our pupils/parents/families/carers/legal guardians:

- Personal information (such as name, age, date of birth and photographs)
- Contact information (such as address and telephone number)
- Financial information (such as bank account details and payment history)
- CCTV footage captured in school and other information obtained through electronic means

WHY DO WE COLLECT, STORE AND USE THIS INFORMATION?

We will only use personal data when the law allows us to. Most commonly, we will use personal data relating to our pupils and their parents/families/carers/legal guardians where we need to comply with our legal obligations and where it is needed in the public interest for us to exercise our authority as a public educational body.

In some cases, we may use personal data where it is necessary for our legitimate interests (or those of a third party) and your interests and fundamental rights do not override those interests. For example, the school has a legitimate interest in providing pupils with an education, safeguarding and promoting pupil welfare, facilitating the efficient operation of the school.

We may also use your personal data, less frequently to protect a pupil's or their family's interests (or someone else's interests). For example, when investigating a complaint made by another pupil.

We keep personal data electronically on the School's information management systems and associated servers, the School's IT network, or manually in indexed filing systems.

Situations in which we will use personal data, including special category data, include:

- **Teaching & Learning**

For example:

- to monitor and report on pupil progress
- to provide appropriate pastoral care

- **Statutory Returns**

For example:

- to monitor equal opportunities

- **Safeguarding & Child Protection**

For example:

- to safeguard pupils
- to manage a pupil's absence

- **Security**

For example:

- to comply with health and safety obligations
- to comply with the law regarding data sharing

- **Business Continuity**

For example:

- to assess the quality of our services

- **Access to Systems**

For example:

- to support pupil learning

- **Communications**

For example:

- to foster links between the school and the local community, including fundraising events

- **Sound Financial Management**

For example

- to provide more efficient means of payment for school facilities such as catering services

CONSENT

Whilst the majority of the personal data provided to the school is required for us to comply with our legal obligations, some of that information is provided on a voluntary basis through parental consent (namely, a parent's/carer's/legal guardian's express agreement). A pupil aged 13 or over is considered capable of giving consent themselves and will not require express agreement from a parent/carer/legal guardian.

Where we need consent, for example use of biometric identification for the school's cashless system, the school will provide the person with parental responsibility for a pupil or, if aged 13 or over, the pupil themselves, with a specific and clear notice which explains the reasons why the data is being collected and how the data will be used. You should be aware if you do not consent to our collection of this type of data, this will not affect the standard of education we deliver to the pupil.

If we ask for your consent to use personal information, you can take back this consent at any time. Please contact the DPO if you would like to withdraw any consent you have given.

Please be aware that we do not need to obtain parental consent if personal data is to be processed for the purposes of obtaining counselling services for the child.

HOW LONG IS DATA STORED FOR?

We will only keep personal data for as long as necessary to fulfil the purposes we collected it (for example, to educate and look after pupils) and including for the purposes of satisfying any legal, accounting, or reporting requirements.

We do not store personal data forever; we only hold pupil and family data for as long as we are legally able to do so. However, sometimes we will keep personal information for historical reasons (e.g. year group or sports team photographs) but you will always have a right to ask for it to be destroyed.

In determining the appropriate retention period for personal data in line with our Disposal of Records Schedule, we consider the amount, nature, and sensitivity of the personal data, the potential risk of harm from unauthorised use or disclosure of your personal data, the purposes for which we process your personal data and whether we can achieve those purposes through other means, and the applicable legal requirements.

In some circumstances we may anonymise your personal data so that it can no longer be associated with you, in which case we may use such data without further notice to you.

DATA SECURITY

We have put in place appropriate security measures to prevent personal data from being accidentally lost, used or accessed in an unauthorised way, altered or disclosed. In addition, we limit access to your personal data to those employees, agents, contractors and other third parties who have a need to know. They will only process personal data on our instructions and they are subject to a duty of confidentiality.

We have put in place procedures to deal with any suspected data security breach and will notify you and any applicable regulator (currently the Information Commissioner's Office) of a suspected breach where we are legally required to do so.

WHO WE SHARE PUPIL DATA WITH

We may have to share pupil and their family's data with third parties, including third-party service providers and other bodies such as:

- the new school/s that the pupil attends after leaving us
- the Department of Education
- the Education Authority for Northern Ireland
- Northern Ireland Council for Curriculum Examinations and Assessments
- The Board of Governors
- General Teaching Council for Northern Ireland

- Youth Council for Northern Ireland
- Exceptional Circumstances Body
- Department of Health and Health & Social Care Trusts
- PSNI
- C2K School Management Information System
- Data Systems such as Moodle
- Ballymena Academy Past Pupil Association
- ParentMail
- Examination Boards such as AQA, CCEA and Excel
- The Centre for Evaluation and Monitoring at Durham University.
- Commercial standardised test providers

Why we share pupil data

We do not share information about our pupils with anyone without consent unless the law and our policies allow us to do so. We only permit access to personal data for specified purpose and in accordance with our instructions.

We are required to share pupils' data with the Department of Education and/or the Education Authority on a statutory basis. This data sharing underpins school funding and educational attainment policy and monitoring. We also share information with the NHS or a pupil's destination upon leaving school.

Pupils aged 13+:

Once our pupils reach the age of 13, we also share certain pupil data with our local authority and / or provider of youth support services as they have responsibilities in relation to the education or training of 13-19 year olds.

This enables them to provide services as follows:

- youth support services
- careers advisers

A parent, carer or guardian can request that **only** their child's name, address and date of birth is passed to their local authority or provider of youth support services by informing us. This right is transferred to the child / pupil once he/she reaches the age 16.

Pupils aged 16+:

We will also share certain data about pupils aged 16+ with Department of Education and/or provider of youth support services as they have responsibilities in relation to the education or training of 13-19 year olds.

This enables them to provide services as follows:

- post-16 education and training providers
- youth support services
- careers advisers.

TRANSFERRING DATA OUTSIDE THE EU

We will not transfer the personal data we collect about you to any country outside the EU without telling you in advance that we intend to do so and what steps we have taken to ensure adequate protection for your personal data in those circumstances.

YOUR RIGHTS OF ACCESS, CORRECTION, ERASURE AND RESTRICTION

Under GDPR, pupils/parents/families and carers have the right to request access to data about them that we hold. To make a request for your personal data, or be given access to your child's educational record, contact the DPO as indicated above.

We may need to request specific information from you to help us confirm your identity and ensure your right to access the data (or to exercise any of your other rights). This is another appropriate security measure to ensure that personal data is not disclosed to any person who has no right to receive it.

Under certain circumstances, by law a parent/carer/legal guardian or a child over the age of 13 has the right to:

- **Request access** to personal data (commonly known as a "data subject access request"). This enables you to receive a copy of the personal data we hold about you and your child and to check that we are lawfully processing it. You will not have to pay a fee to access your personal data (or to exercise any of the other rights). However, we may charge a reasonable fee if your request for access is clearly unfounded or excessive. Alternatively, we may refuse to comply with the request in such circumstances
- **Request correction** of the personal data that we hold about you and your child. This enables you to have any incomplete or inaccurate data we hold corrected
- **Request erasure** of personal data. This enables you to ask us to delete or remove personal data where there is no good reason for us continuing to process it. You also have the right to ask us to delete or remove your personal data where you have exercised your right to object to processing (see below)
- **Object to processing** of personal data where we are relying on a legitimate interest (or that of a third party) and there is something about your particular situation which makes you want to object to processing on this ground. You also have the right to object where we are processing you and your child's personal data for direct marketing purposes
- **Request the transfer** of your personal data to another party, for instance a new school.
